## **Speaker Series**

Wed Feb 20: Insects - Conservation, Perceptions, and Early Education presented by Elizabeth Boileau. Why do we prefer some insects over others? Why are we scared of insects that are harmless? How does our negative attitude towards these animals impact conservation efforts? What influences beliefs in our early years of life? Elizabeth argues that we need to think critically about the messaging children receive about insects in order to promote positive perceptions of insects if we are to protect these vulnerable creatures.

Elizabeth is a doctoral student at Lakehead University in the Educational Studies program. Her research is focused on early childhood environmental education, which includes childnature relationships and outdoor preschool programs such as Forest Schools. She is currently working on her Forest School Canada Practitioner training course and is a Board member of the Canadian Network for Environmental Education and Communication.

Wed Mar 20: Antarctica: History, Science and Overwintering at Scott Base presented by Melinda Bell. What would you say to traveling to one of the most remote job sites in the world to preserve artefacts from some of the most iconic historic sites on the planet? If you were Melinda Bell, you'd say yes – twice! As a member of the Antarctic Heritage Trust Winter Conservator Crew (2009 and 2010), the task required living and working at a science base on an island at "the end of the earth," in the pursuit of heritage conservation. This presentation will provide an overview of that adventure.

With a keen childhood interest in "Little House on the Prairie" and "Indiana Jones", it was inevitable that Melinda pursued an Honours Bachelor of Arts in Anthropology (Lakehead University), followed by a Diploma in Collections Conservation and Management (Sir Sandford Fleming College). She has worked at Fort William Historical Park, studied rock art in Lake of the Woods, dug for bison bones in SW Manitoba, volunteered at the Canadian Canoe Museum, interned at Colonial Williamsburg, and travelled to the other side of the world to take part in heritage preservation projects.

## **Bird Study Group**

Wed Feb 6: An Alberta Big Year, presented by Howard Heffler. Howard Heffler is a chemical engineer who spent most of his career in Calgary as an environmental manager in the petroleum industry. He and his wife, Lyn, have always participated in outdoor activities such as hiking, skiing, and paddling. Over the past twenty years, birding has grown to become a primary interest. During 2018, Howard, with the support of Lyn and friends, focused all of his birding efforts in Alberta.

This presentation will first describe the planning, organization and results of his "big year". The objective was not to set any record, but to develop a better appreciation of Alberta's birds and ecoregions. The second half will be an entertaining series of anecdotes and adventures to reach the year-end total of 304 species.

Wed March 6: Birding in Sri Lanka, presented by John Bargman and Ena Spalding. John Bargman and Ena Spalding visited Sri Lanka in March 2018 for two weeks, including 10 days birding in various habitats in central and southern regions of the country with a local bird guide.

This presentation features their photographs and information on Sri Lanka's birds and bird habitats, and how they saw 33 of the 34 endemic species. John and Ena have been watching birds for most of their lives and are also keen photographers.
