
#### March 17: Counting and Managing Grizzly Bears in Kananaskis Country

Speaker: John Paczkowski

For 20 years, the program has aimed to reduce bear-human incidents by monitoring and conditioning grizzly bears in the region.

# **Field Trips**

Please visit our website for the most up-to-date news and updates on future field trips.

Nature Calgary organizes volunteer led field trips. Participants are responsible for bringing their own food, water, sunscreen, bug spray and any other items that they may require for the duration of the trip.

Trips are limited to a maximum of ten participants (members only) and pre-registration is required. Participants must wear appropriate face covering (masks).

#### COVID-19 Protocols (Apply to all Nature Calgary field trips)

- 1. Maximum of 10 Participants including the leader.
- 2. Participants must be members of Nature Calgary.
- 3. Pre-registration is required.
- 4. Participants must sign a waiver form either on site or bring one already signed.
- 5. Masks or face shields must be worn when outside the vehicle.
- 6. Carpooling should only be done with occupants of the same household or bubble.
- 7. Refrain from sharing scopes, binoculars, field guides, etc. with people outside of your bubble.
- 8. Maximum of 5 vehicles plus the leader's vehicle for out of multi-destination trips (denoted by \*).

#### City Nature Challenge 2021: Calgary Metropolitan Region

Nature Calgary is proud to sponsor the 3rd annual City Nature Challenge YYC Event! Help Calgary compete in the 2021 City Nature Challenge (CNC) April 30-May 3! Join the challenge to see how Calgary's local biodiversity stacks up to other cities around the world. Over 325 other cities globally will participate to see which city can make the most observations, document the most species, and engage the most people.

To participate, take photos of urban flora and fauna April 30-May 3 in your yards, neighborhoods, and local parks, then submit your observations to the iNaturalist app or directly to iNaturalist.ca. #### Human-Wildlife Coexistence:

You may have recently heard about the "Owl-Mania" that occurred in the Weaselhead Natural Area after a rare Boreal Owl was spotted in the park. Multiple Northern Saw-Whet owls were also observed during the same week attracting quite the audience from around Southern Alberta! By all accounts the owls were very stressed. As a community of naturalists, we can improve human-wildlife coexistence in Calgary by educating others how to observe and appreciate wildlife in a safe and respectful manner. Here are some 'best practices' we can share with others:

**Give Wildlife Space:** It may be tempting to get closer but the presence of people can stress wildlife out! Never approach, surround, follow, taunt, or feed wildlife.

**Photography and Social Media:** If you see something remarkable, refrain from sharing the exact location. Obscure the location or wait a few weeks to share it.

**Wildlife can feed themselves:** Please avoid feeding wildlife or leaving any attractants in natural areas. By feeding wildlife we create dependencies and alter wildlife foraging behavior.

**Leave only Footprints:** Help keep our natural areas clean and healthy. Take photos but leave all plants (and wildlife) in the parks!

**Off-leash dogs:** help educate people on why off-leash dogs are not permitted in natural areas. Consider phoning 3-1-1 if you are uncomfortable approaching someone and report to bylaw. **Be Kind:** We all get frustrated when we see behavior that affects our parks. By being kind we help people recognize and appreciate the natural beauty of our parks... and why they are so important for people and the living things within them.


(EPHS) Book Pre-Orders EPHS has written an extensive history
